Plant <u>Uses in Colonial Times</u>

Broom Dried branch used as a broom; oil used for pain relief.

Catmint Used for colds, headaches, fever, insomnia; cats like the leaves.

Chives Onion flavor, used in cooking; colonists believed it drove away

diseases and evil influences so they hung bunches in the home.

Costmary Refreshing odor, leaf kept in the Bible to keep away drowsiness

in church.

Lamb's Ears Leaves make natural bandage; called the colonial Band-Aid.

Lavender Fragrant in sachets, moth repellent

Lemon Balm Used in soothing tea; used as furniture polish

Spearmint Aids in digestion, used as a breath freshener (mouthwash).

Sage Flavorings used in stuffing and sausage; used as a dye for hair

and fabric; used as cough medicine

Southernwood Strewn as a moth and flea repellent

Sweet Fragrant, used in mattress stuffing Woodruff

Tansy Insect repellent, used to wash floors

Thyme Used in an ointment to remove warts; used in cooking

Yarrow Used in tea and beer; leaves carried in a pouch as a natural first

aid kit to stop bleeding; used to help toothache
